The world's longest walking distance is 14,000 miles. You can walk from Magadan in Russia to Cape Town in South Africa. It requires no flying or sailing, just bridges and open roads.

Only two people have ever swam the entire length of the 2,350 mile Mississippi River: Slovenian long distance swimmer Martin Strel in 2002 and American former Navy SEAL Chris Ring in 2015. Strel swam for 68 days in a row; Ring took one day off a week, taking 181 days.

Approximately 35 million living Christmas trees are sold each year in the U.S.; more than 45 million are planted.

The tallest christmas tree ever displayed was in Seattle, Washington, in 1950. It measured 221 feet tall and it was believed to be up to 287 years old and weighed roughly 50,000 pounds.

On December 2nd, legend has it that Lydia Darragh single-handedly saved the lives of General George Washington and his Continental Army. Darragh overheard the British commanders planning a surprise attack on Washington's army at Whitemarsh, Pennsylvania. Using a cover story that she needed to buy flour from a nearby mill just outside the British line, Darragh passed the information to American Lieutenant Colonel Thomas Craig. The British then marched towards Whitemarsh on the evening of December 4th, 1777, and were surprised to find General Washington and the Continental Army waiting for them.

911 On December 14th, Norwegian Roald
Amundsen became the first explorer to reach
the South Pole, beating his British rival,
Robert Falcon Scott. Amundsen completed
his preparations and in June 1910, sailed
for Antarctica, where the English explorer
Robert F. Scott was also headed with the aim
of reaching the South Pole. After his historic
Antarctic journey, Amundsen established
a successful shipping business. He later
made attempts to become the first explorer
to fly over the North Pole. In 1926, he
passed over the North Pole in a dirigible.

On December 25th, just after midnight on Christmas morning, the majority of German troops engaged in World War I ceased firing their guns and artillery and started to sing Christmas carols. At the first light of dawn, many of the German soldiers emerged from their trenches and approached the Allied lines across no-man's-land, calling out "Merry Christmas" in their enemies' native tongues. The men exchanged presents of cigarettes and plum puddings and sang carols and songs.
