## Dates in History

365

On July 21st, a powerful earthquake off the coast of Greece caused a tsunami that devastated the city of Alexandria, Egypt. Scientists now estimate that the quake was actually two tremors in succession, the largest of which is thought to have had a magnitude of 8.0. The quake was centered near the plate boundary called the Hellenic Arc and quickly sent a wall of water across the Mediterranean Sea toward the Egyptian coast. Ships in the harbor at Alexandria were overturned as the water near the coast receded suddenly. In Alexandria, approximately 5,000 people lost their lives and 50,000 homes were destroyed.

1949

On July 27th, the world's first jet-propelled airliner, the British De Havilland Comet, made its maiden test-flight in England. The jet engine would ultimately revolutionize the airline industry, shrinking air travel time in half by enabling planes to climb faster and fly higher. The Comet was the creation of English aircraft designer and aviation pioneer Sir Geoffrey de Havilland. After its July 1949 test flight, the Comet underwent three more years of testing and training flights. Then, on May 2nd, 1952, the British Overseas Aircraft Corporation (BOAC) began the world's first commercial jet service with the 44-seat Comet 1A, flying paying passengers from London to Johannesburg.

1997

On July 4th, after traveling 120 million miles (193 million kilometers) in seven months, NASA's Mars *Pathfinder* became the first U.S. spacecraft to land on Mars in more than two decades. In an ingenious, costsaving landing procedure, *Pathfinder* used parachutes to slow its approach to the Martian surface and then deployed airbags to cushion its impact. The Mars *Pathfinder* mission, which cost just \$150 million (\$280 million today), was hailed as a triumph for NASA.
